Dr. Franklin, the James B. Duke Professor Emeritus of History, built his reputation as a scholar in 1947 with the publication of his book, *From Slavery to Freedom: A History of African-Americans*, still considered the definitive account of the black experience in America.

CITIZEN



Dr. Franklin worked on the *Brown v. Board of Education* (1954) case, was active in the civil rights movement, headed President Clinton's 1997 national advisory board on race, and witnessed the inauguration of the nation's first black president.


