Southern Student Division EMERGENCY PEACE CAMPAIGN

PROGRAM for 1936

I. Complete the formation of campus committees in every college in the ten Southeastern states. This is to be accomplished through state organizations already functioning.

II. Thorough planning of spring meetings, summer training, autumn education and action campaign.

III. Spring meetings between Easter and Goodwill Day: April 12 to May 18. (It is probably advisable to begin meetings only after the national broadcast.)

1. A special spring Mass Meeting committee.

2. Special speakers for a whole day's conference, covering at least: Neutrality, Social Foundations of peace, Spiritual Foundations of peace.

3. Forum discussions on forces for peace and for war: campus, community, national, and international.

4. Registration of attitudes, and of work one is willing to do.

5. Follow-up, gearing III into IV and V.

IV. Summer training: in summer conferences of Christian Associations and of churches; in summer service groups and presidents' schools of the Christian Associations; in Friends' Service Committee Camps; in experimental undertakings in the home community; in private reading and personal discipline; in special train-

ing projects for select students provided by the Council of the E.P.C. In these ways and other ways, students may both work for peace during the summer and prepare to be more effective peacemakers during the next college year.

V. Intensive Autumn Campaign:

1) Study and discussion groups covering both emergency and long-time issues affecting peace---as interest, time and leadership determine. The campus committee should be such a group this spring, and develop and lead many groups this fall. A brief syllabus to stimulate and guide discussion will soon be available.

2) Mass meetings and forums, led by those schooled in the smaller groups, as well as by invited speakers.

3) Deputations to high schools, churches, labor meetings, other colleges....

4) Organization of city and community E.P.C. committees.

5) Education of voters; pressure on candidates, and on officials when elected.

Until the middle of May, Claud Nelson, part-time executive for E.P.C. in the South, will be traveling most of the time, but will be at his office part of each week, as a rule: 252 Winona Drive, Decatur, Georgia.
