Dr. Brown stated that it is the aim of the English department to give the student a knowledge of the English language and of how to use it, and a knowledge of great literature which brings us beauty, a faithful portrayal of life, and a re-creation of the great novel truth. It is also their ambition to give the student a knowledge of the history of literature and man, and to teach them how to think.

The English department also includes the work in public speaking, dramatics, journalism and graduate instruction.

of applying for a third year of study after at Oxford or in any prominent university on the continent. This privilege is extended, however, only on the basis of a good record compiled during the first two years.

Rhodes scholars are chosen from eight selected districts, four named from each district, and thus 32 American students start their career in England each year.

Thirty-six students are selected from all over the British Empire, including Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and the Union of South Africa. Once every three years, students come from Jamaica, Bermuda, and Malta. Germany is the sole non-English speaking nation provided for in the Rhodes will. This provision was suspended during the World war, but the quota has been revised to allow two German scholars to enter Oxford each year.

Time changes on the surface of stone aid in the authentication of stone, Dr. Fink said. He spoke somewhat of authentication of paintings and said that fluorescence does not in paintings of ancient origin. The violet ray is used as a detector of this reaction.

Dr. Fink's electrochemical methods involve the reversing of the process of corrosion, using a 2 per cent solution of sodium hydroxide at the cathode and removing the oxygen and carbonic acid. Illustrations of the effect the Fink process has upon old bronze figures and pieces were well borne out by the slides, which were commented upon and explained by Dr. Fink.
